At one point, Lamb played a game of catch in a hospital hallway with AJ Thomas, who is 12 and awaiting spinal surgery.

"It's just great to be back in the community," Martin said. "We had a couple years where we haven't been able to come out here and see the joy that we give some of these kids in these tough times around the holidays. It's really special for us."
